PUBLIC HEARING –MAYOR SHAW

- Mayor Jed Shaw called the public hearing meeting to order at 6:01 p.m.

- Hear public comment on the proposed adoption of Ordinance 2019-02 an Ordinance adding Transitional Housing Standards to the Walker City Code.

Wilkening reviews with the public the history of how the proposed transitional housing standards came before the planning commission. Several months ago a charity came to the City questioning what our transitional housing regulations were and we did not have any. Pam did research on other towns that help regulate that type of activity. He adds that there are State laws in place and certain criteria that must be followed. We reviewed the City of Bemidji’s regulations and made some tailored changes that fit our community regulating the property, not the person. The result is the Ordinance that we are presenting as an opportunity of consideration this evening.

Czycalla Questioned the February 25th planning commission meeting draft that was pulled from the website; referring to section B number 3. She states that there are things taken out as far as the location being 500 feet of the location of certain things. She states that in the last draft she printed out many of the things were taken out except for licensed daycares, schools and libraries. She feels that the trails, parks, residential housing for vulnerable adults should be left in there. Walker has assisted living and memory care

group homes and I think that language should still be left in there where transitional housing would not be allowed within 500 feet of those boundaries.

Valen questioned what would be her reason for including those?

Czycalla-There is vulnerable populations that have to be protected. Those people living in transitional housing...

Valen questioned what it is about those people...

Czycalla stated that when you look of the definition of Minnesota State Statutes it states that transitional housing is for homeless people or families. And the word homeless is taken out of the proposed draft and stressed that needs to stay in there as well.

Valen clarified that the reason for the changes are that we can regulate the property and not the person. He added that her concern is based on that the people at that facility are somehow more dangerous than other people. We have no data that would support that.

Czycalla stated that she is concerned about her property value; if they were to move close to me how that would affect her property value.

Valen questioned if she had a study that would indicate that would adversely affect you.

Czycalla responded that she does not have study but personally feels that way.

Valen stated that if the Council were to do that it would need to be based on some kind of a reliable study that would support those conclusions.

Arola questioned if there was a place in town that they were looking at.

Swor communicated that he was from Saint Vincent de Paul and states that they are the organization looking at transitional housing. He explains that the concept behind this is, to have a job you have to have a permanent location; a home address. What happens is when people get a job it takes almost a month before you get your first paycheck and it takes a bit longer than that before you can get section eight housing. We are looking at helping the people that are trying to get on their feet. Right now we are just doing the discovery aspect of this to see what the response is from the public and ask whether we can afford it or not because we are a small community. We would be working with Bicap and Access North as far as training is concerned. If there is anyone there staff would be on hand 24/7 while someone is living there. We can help them if they need help with budgets, if they need to be trained as far as cooking is concerned. We are looking at Veterans that possibly might have PTSD. We are looking at anybody that needs that opportunity to get a foot up. He added that initially they were looking at the location of the old video store over by Jimmy's. It would house three people at a time. We would have three bedrooms and a common kitchen and washing facilities. He explained that he didn't want anything were there were a bunch of people smoking outside. He added that he has the same concerns and does not want people that don't belong there. They will be actively looking for jobs and if they are not they are not fulfilling their part of the agreement.

Arola questioned if they feel they have enough resources if there is a setback.

Swor stated that after several people received jobs they ended up working out of town; RDO. These are people that we put up in someone's personal home. Another one we managed to get some tents and sleeping bags and bicycles and they stayed at a campground until they found jobs.

Arola questioned if up to three people was a sure thing.

Swor stated that they would have facilities for up to three people any more than that we would not be able to take care of them. He added that he spoke with the Veterans

Association and annually they try to find jobs for about four Veterans in our area and Access North; all together they try to find jobs for about twelve people a year up here. Our thought is if we can even help three people become viable citizens again; we will do what we can.

Arola stated that her concern is that there are already four group homes in this small town. Do we really want more of this?

Shaw stated for the record they are discussing the actual Ordinance that the City would have not Group Homes. While he can answer questions what he specifically may do that is going to have nothing whatsoever to do with the Ordinance that we pass. If you have any questions specifically about the Ordinance please let them be known.

Wilkening added that Ordinance is very State specific as to what can and can't be regulated. We as a Council need to follow State Statute in order to keep us out of legal problems. The regulations that are being imposed are similar to VRBO.

No other public comments or questions were heard.

Public hearing closed at 6:12 p.m.

➤ Texas 4000

Bjorklund stated that day one found them in Lampasas, TX and day 70 of the ride will find them in Anchorage, AK. On day 39 they will be in Walker, MN overnight. Paul has put together a group of citizens and a group of people that will be hosting these people in their homes overnight and will be doing a cook out at the park. I want to make you all aware that we are going to have a lot of people in town that day. Getting the bronze level of a bike friendly community we want to make sure that everybody is aware so that we can extend our kindness and hopefully at least half of the 28 riders will come back another day and just spend time with us.

Nye stated that there are three teams doing this trip starting from the University of Texas and 28 members in each team. The Ozark team is coming through Walker. He stated that he looked at their itinerary and they are spending more time in the State of Minnesota than any other State. He added that these kids are the cream of the crop of go getters and motivators. Each member of the team had to raise \$4,000, participate 50 hours of community service and do weekly training rides before going on this trip for a whole year. All of them in one way or another have been affected by cancer.

The Council thanks Paul and the good job he has done.

Nye added that for the record the Barbeque in the park is not a public event.

➤ Sourcewell Grant

Bjorklund stated the end of 2019 they are due to order a new squad car that will be delivered in 2020 upon Council approval. Wayne has applied to Sourcewell for one of their small project partnership grants. We received a check today for \$2,500 to help with the squad camera.

Findings of Fact:

1. Both the North Tract and the South Tract are currently zoned Transitional Commercial and is properly zoned where both residential and commercial uses should coexist intended uses as permitted in the Transitional Commercial zone.
2. Both Tracts are connected to public water and sewer.
3. The applicant is not proposing any provisions for water-based recreation.
4. Lot areas and dimensions conform to the requirements of the zoning provisions, without variance. The minimum lot size for newly created lots in the Transitional Commercial zone is 5,000 sq. ft. The proposed division is as follows: North Tract 26,795 ± square feet and the South Tract 26,325 ± square feet.
5. Future development will not be constrained by the proposed lot layouts.
6. Each lot is subject to the right-of-way designated on Lake May Road and Eighth Street (State Highway No. 34).

Condition:

1. Any proposed additions or renovations will require application for a building permit.

4. **M/S Hansen/Wilkening** to approve of Ordinance 2019-02, an Ordinance adding Transitional Housing Standards to the Walker City Code.

Senenfelder asks for clarification on why language was deleted.

Valen stated that the idea was that we are regulating the property and not the people.

Without some kind of a factual study showing that people who would use this

transitional housing would be more dangerous than your current next door neighbor; I don't think we could justify the provisions that would restrict their placement. Senenfelder questioned if he knew why that was left in the language when Bemidji drafted their Ordinance.

Wilkening stated this would have to be able to be upheld in court. If you go by State Statute and anything in the Federal Fair Housing Act we would comply. If we left some of the language that we have taken out it is questionable. We could open ourselves to a potential for a lawsuit. Which John basically stated that he wouldn't be able to defend us?

Senenfelder questioned why a City much larger than us left that language in there.

Valen stated that he did not have an answer to that.

Senenfelder questioned the 500 feet from any other transitional use, adding that we could end up with two of them as long as they are not within 500 feet of each other.

Valen clarifies that the 500 feet did not come from him.

Wilkening stated the 500 feet is following the State guidelines.

5. **M/S** Hansen/Moore to approve of Resolution 32-2019, a resolution authorizing summary publication of ordinance 2019-02, an ordinance adding transitional housing standards to the walker city code.

Wilkening stated that if we don't add this to our Ordinance we would be doing a greater disservice to our residents for what we can legally adopt. We are fortunate by having the organization come in up front and have worked with us and have not pressured us to make a decision and allowed us to sort through this whole process.

Senenfelder stated that he understands the need for an Ordinance adding that he would like to know why other Cities could win that battle with stronger restrictions and why we felt we couldn't.

Shaw stated that he is basing that off of that they simply passed that Ordinance that hasn't been challenged as of yet.

Senenfelder stated that he would like to see and ask why it was passed as is.

The Council clarifies that Bemidji's is by Interim Use as would be ours.

Wilkening stated that there is a biannual review and approval process.

Shaw stated that he understands Senenfelder concern with this and could look into it further.
